
The terms jail and prison are often used interchangeably. However, jails and prisons are different in many ways!


# Terms: Probation & Parole

**Probation** refers to adult offenders whom courts place on supervision in the community through a probation agency, generally in lieu of incarceration

**Parole** refers to criminal offenders who are conditionally released from prison to serve the remaining portion of their sentence in the community

### POPULATION: US INCARCERATION RATES






#### How many people are locked up in the United States?

# JAIL "CHURINING"

In a typical year, about <u>600,000</u> <u>people</u> enter *prison* gates, but people go to *jail* over <u>10 million times</u> each year

At least 1 in 4 people who go to jail will be <u>arrested again</u> within the same year often those dealing with poverty, mental illness, and substance use disorders, whose problems only worsen with incarceration (Sawyer & Wagner, 2022)






POPULATION: OKLAHOMA INCARCERATION RATES

Answer: 34,000 of Oklahoma's residents are incarcerated.







## POPULATION: OKLAHOMA CRIMINAL LEGAL SYSTEM




## **POPULATION:** OKLAHOMA **RESIDENT &** INCARCERATED POPULATIONS




#### Comparing Oklahoma's resident and incarcerated populations





# PARENTAL INCARCERATION: CODE OF SILENCE

Having negative visitation experiences


Feeling ashamed and/or embarrassment

Feeling at fault for their parent's arrest

Receiving little information about the arrest/incarceration

Experiencing their parent's re-incarceration

# PARENTAL INCARCERATION: COLLATERAL CONSEQUENCES

Trauma:Violence, parental arrest, visits (Arditti, 2012)

Stress & Anxiety: Unstable attachment, fear, stigma, ambiguity (Poehlmann–Tynan, et al., 2017)

Major Life Disruptions: Caregivers, homes, schools (Kramer & Burton, 2016)

Family Financial Burden:Court & legal fees, phone bills, visits (Braman, 2004)

# PARENTAL INCARCERATION: COLLATERAL CONSEQUENCES

### Loss of Parent

- 40% of children **lose a resident parent** when parent is incarcerated
- 20% lose their primary caregiver

### Risks

- Heightened risk for foster care placement and permanent separation from family members
- More likely to live in a household facing economic strain, to experience financial hardship, and to be at risk of homelessness

### PARENTAL INCARCERATION & COLLATERAL CONSEQUENCES: SEPARATION & DISTANCE

An estimated 62% of parents in state prisons and 84% of parents in federal prisons are **held over 100 miles away from home**.

An estimated 43% of parents in federal prisons are held over 500 miles away from home.



Ethical consideration: should judges and/or correctional facilities consider the placement of a parent in relation to where their child resides?

# PARENTAL INCARCERATION & COLLATERAL CONSEQUENCES: FINANCIAL BURDEN

Families lose primary income earners and face expenses directly related to the criminal legal system involvement such as legal fees, court fees, and bail or bond fees.

Families face extra financial burdens maintaining family ties including phone bills, sending care, and the cost of visiting. Parental incarceration increases the risk of children living in poverty or experience household instability independent of other family risk factors such as parental substance use, mental health issues or poor educational experiences.

# CHILDREN OF INCARCERATED PARENTS: WHAT WE KNOW

#### When compared to their peers...

(...) minority children and children from low SES backgrounds are more like likely to experience parental incarceration.

(...) children living in poverty are more than three times as likely to experience parental incarceration. (Murphey & Cooper, 2015)

(...) children of incarcerated parents are more likely to live with non-parental guardians, receive public assistance, and experience residential instability. (Geller, Garfinkel, Cooper, and Mincy (2009)

# CHILDREN OF INCARCERATED PARENTS: HOW WE KNOW IT

Developmental outcomes of children with incarcerated parents is an emerging area of research.

Conducting research with children and analyzing their developmental outcomes can be difficult, and ......this data can be messy

Large data sets designed for other research areas

- Indicators of prison vs. jail
- *Residential/non-residential parent information*





# PARENTAL INCARCERATION: KEY RESILIENCE FACTORS



Relationship with parent prior to incarceration

Involvement in extracurricular activities Opportunity to to maintain contact with parent

Social support system (That includes incarcerated parent if in best interest of child)

Ability to set or consider life goals (That debunk stigma and stereotypes)

HOW CAN WE	
HELP?	

Protect	Protect children when a parent is arrested.
Support	Support caregivers of children during a spell of parental incarceration, especially in the areas of poverty prevention, parenting, and mental health.
Support	Support children's ability to have positive family relationships during parental incarceration.
Facilitate	Facilitate pathways to successful reentry and family reunification for incarcerated parents.



observation/coaching/debriefing with incarcerated parents Other people in the visitation space


Staff training


